

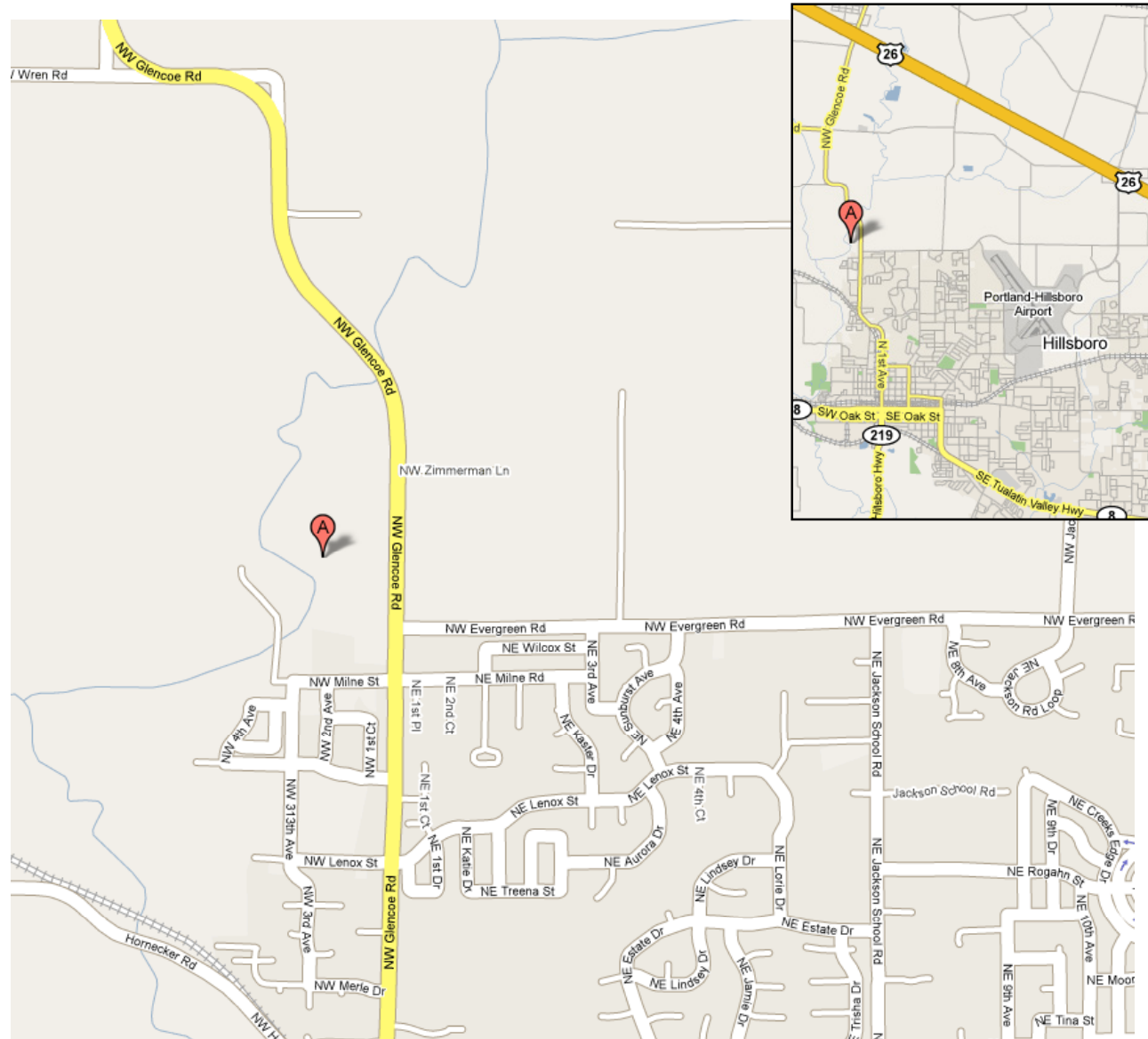

Robert and Barbara Falconer 4315 NW Glencoe Rd, Hillsboro, OR 97124

A 4 $\frac{1}{4}$ acre "experimental farm" with edibles, ornamentals, and more.

Description: This large, not-quite-urban homestead includes a perennial garden, a cutting garden with blooms started from seed in the greenhouse, and a large vegetable garden that produces more than enough produce for the owners' family and friends. There's also a lovely pond, in which you're likely to find watercress as well as water lilies. At various times cattle, sheep, turkeys, and pheasant have resided on the property. Now, nine hens rule the roost, and provide great fertilizer!

Directions: Traveling west on Hwy 26 from 217 take exit 57 for Glencoe Rd. Turn left onto NW Glencoe Rd (also known as 1st St.). Home is 3 miles on the right. Please park in the Evergreen Christian Center parking lot across the street. Use extreme caution crossing this busy road."



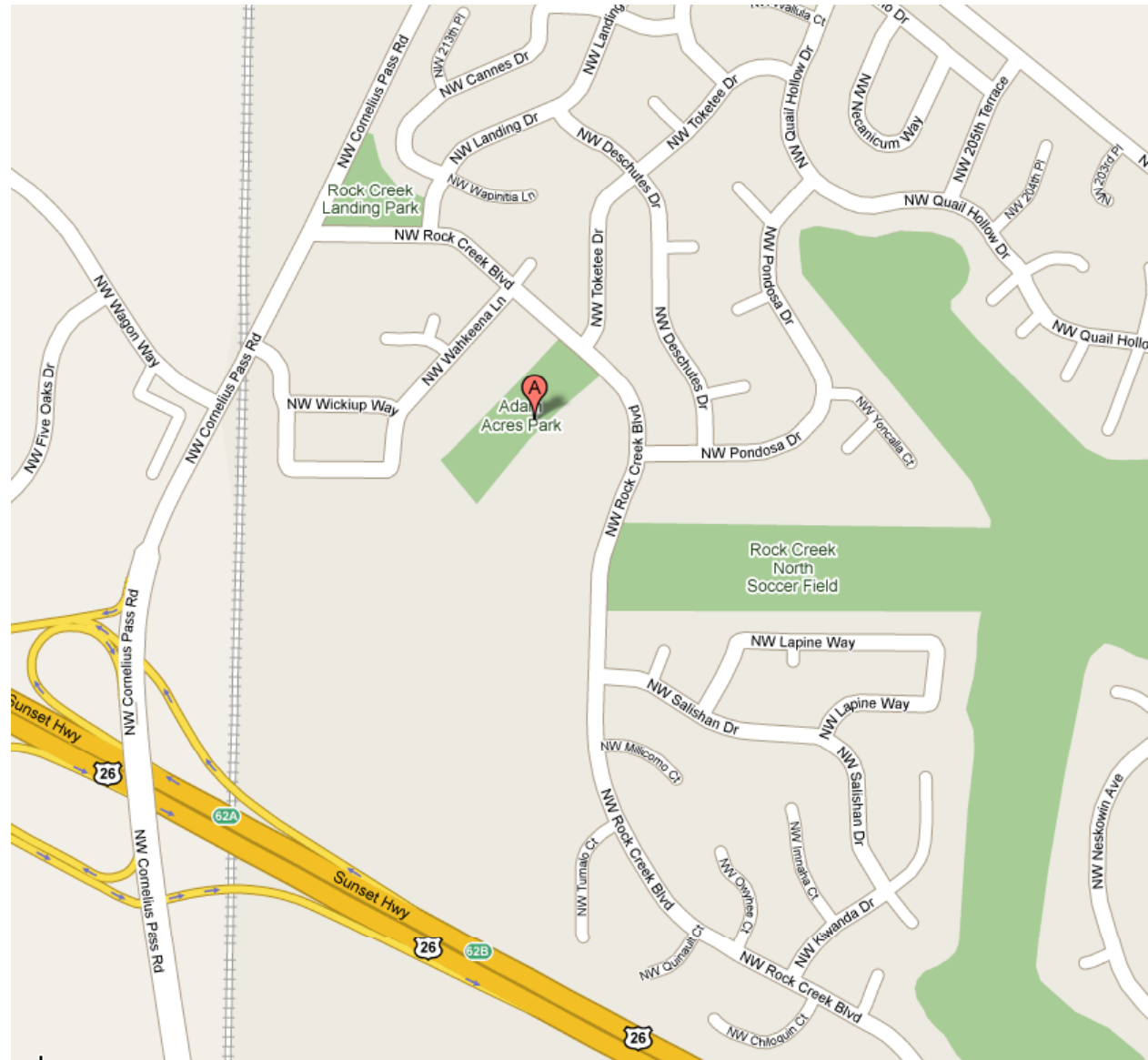

Bill Klug, Lenox School Garden 21200 NW Rock Creek Blvd, Portland OR

Students work and learn in this school garden that features eight raised vegetable and herb beds and a variety of themed gardens.

Description: It truly took a village to create this garden. Teachers, parents, students, and other community members and groups have pitched in. Students in the after-school garden club work and learn in the vegetable garden, butterfly garden, and Oregon native plant garden. The center garden, still in the design stage, will be planted by our tour date. Come find out what these young gardeners decided to create!

Directions: Traveling west on Hwy 26 from 217 take exit 62. Turn right (north) onto NW Cornelius Pass Rd. Turn right onto NW Rock Creek Blvd. Lenox School will be on the right. Look for signs to the garden.



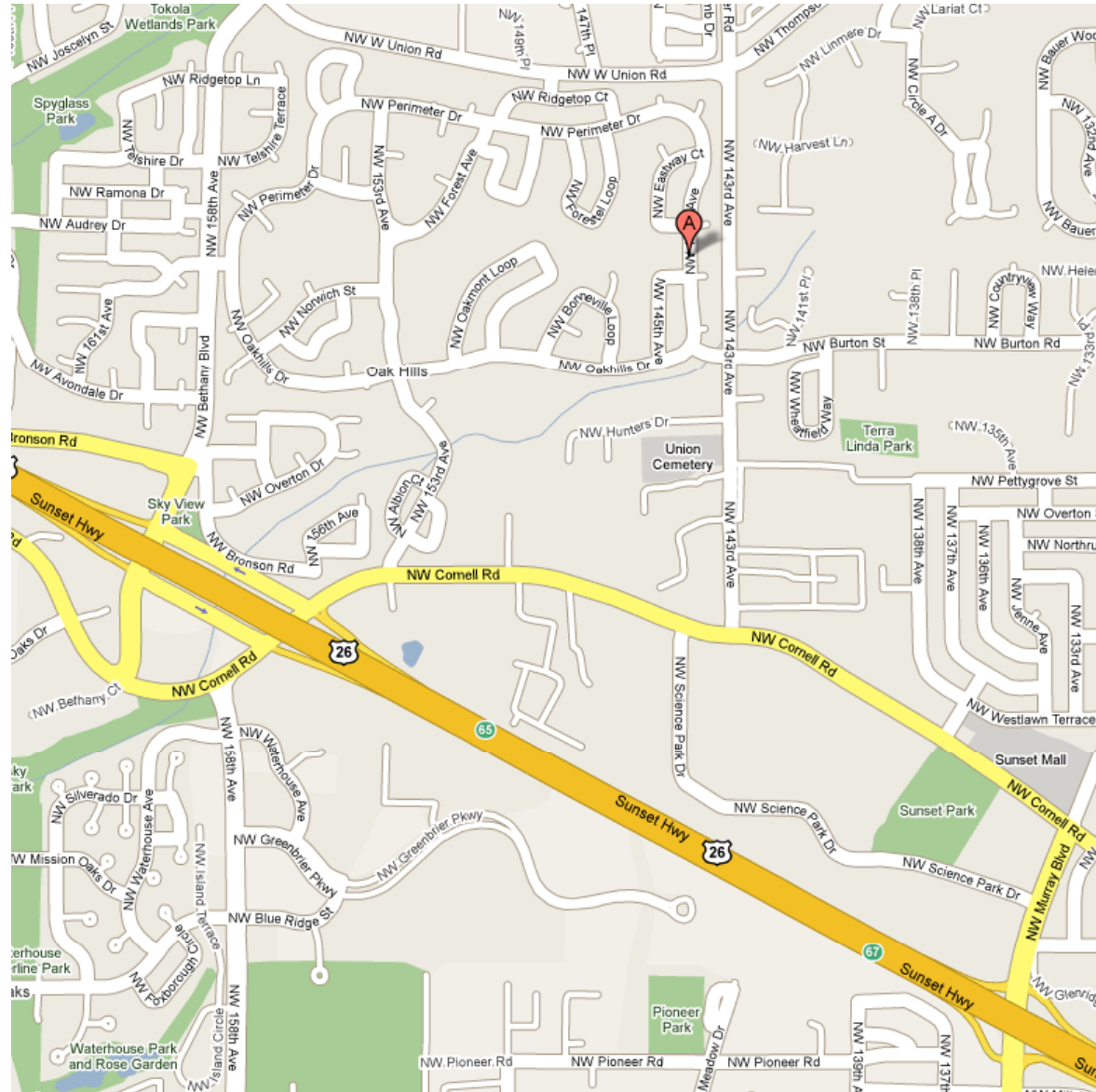

Margie Lachman 2630 NW 144th Ave, Beaverton, OR 97006

This all-organic garden demonstrates that you don't need chemicals to grow gorgeous plants; even roses.

Description: This organic garden has some of everything! The front door is graced by a 50 year old lace leaf Japanese maple. There are 22 fragrant (is there any other kind??) roses. Hybrid teas, English (David Austin), shrub and a climber give me loads of bouquets. A large vegetable garden on the south side provides us with lots of tasty foods. The front and back gardens have both sun and shade perennial beds. On the north side, there is a 40 foot long fern garden. The back garden features a hummingbird/ butterfly garden, a new woodland garden which is virtually slug-proof and a lovely Koi pond.

Directions: Traveling west on Hwy 26 from 217 take the Murray Rd off ramp (exit 67). Turn right onto Murray Blvd. Turn left onto Cornell Rd. Turn right onto NW 143rd Ave. Turn left onto NW Oakhills Dr. Turn right onto NW 144th Ave.

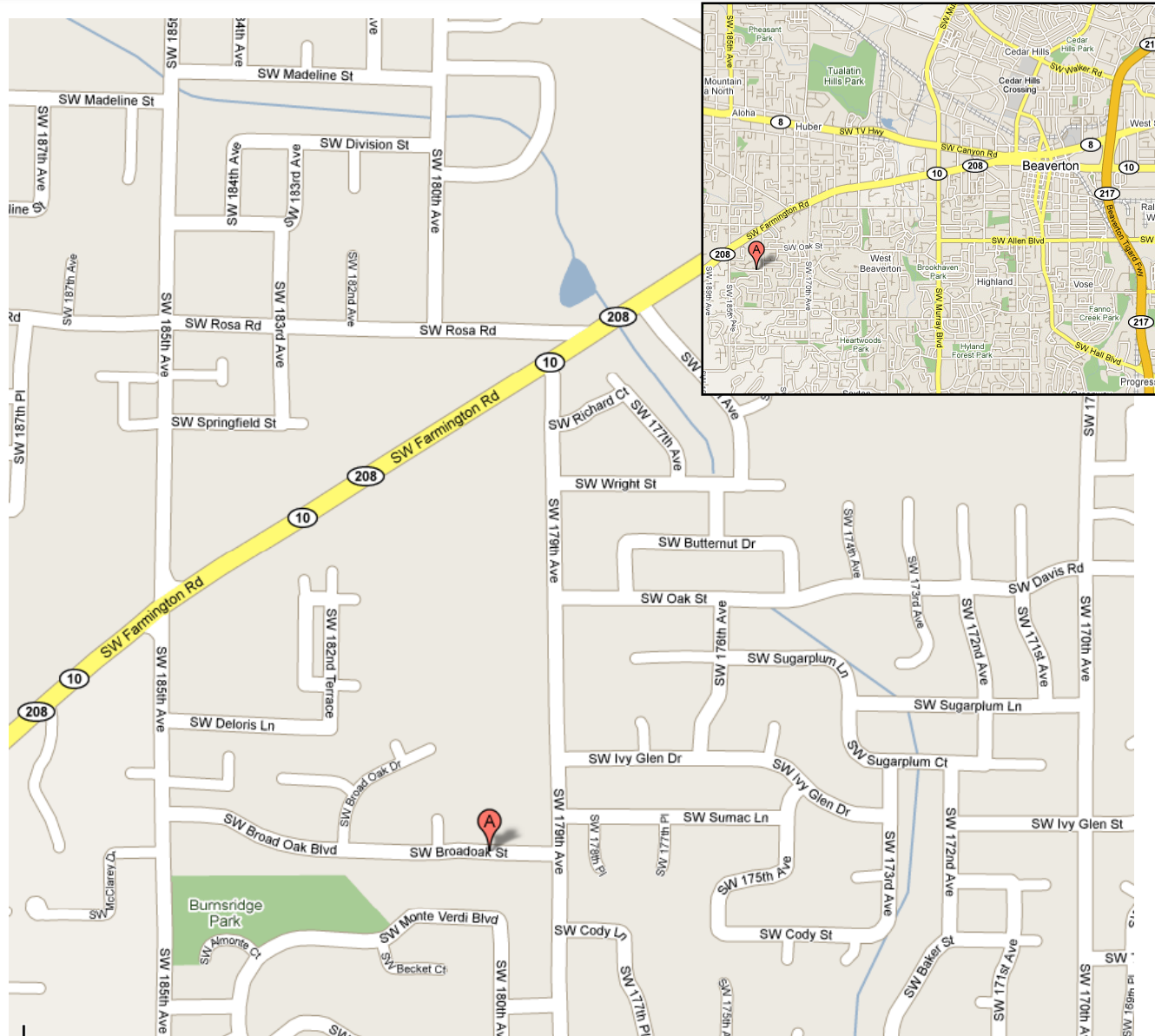

A $\frac{1}{4}$ acre garden with a focus on fruit trees and attracting birds and butterflies.

Description: A home orchard of 19 fruit trees, 3 varieties of grapes, and raised beds and pots filled with strawberries and vegetables. Garden rooms have been created using recycled or discarded items. Container plantings fill spots with texture, interest, and depth. All flowers and shrubs have been selected to attract birds and butterflies. An herb garden, a heather garden, and more; there's lots to see on this quarter acre.

Directions: Traveling south on 217 from Hwy 26 take the Farmington Rd off ramp (exit 2A). Turn right onto SW Farmington Rd. Turn left onto SW 179th Ave. Turn right onto SW Broad Oak Blvd.

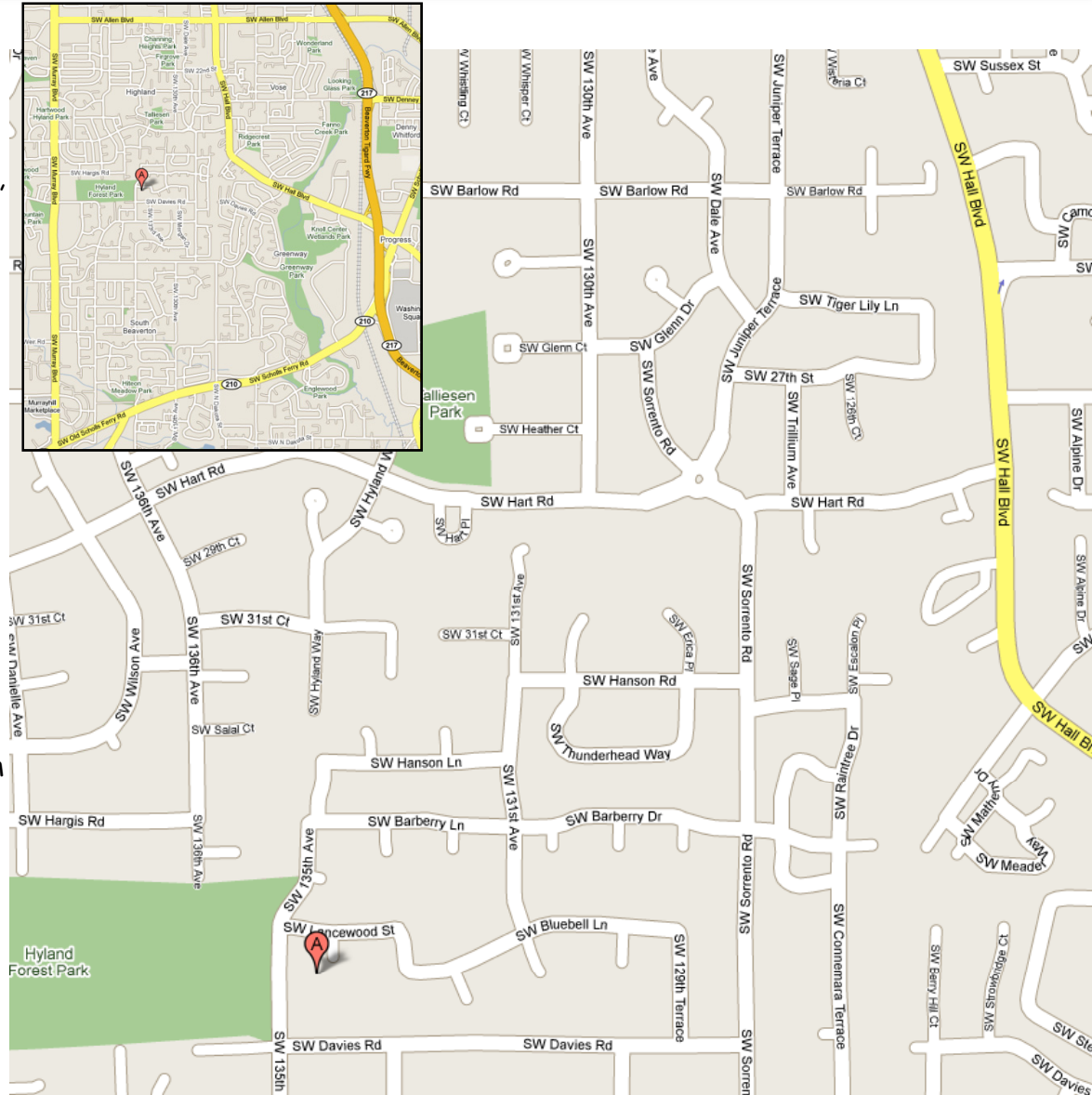
Charles Neiman 8135 SW Aralia Pl., Beaverton, OR 97008

A plant lover's paradise on a quiet cul-de-sac.

Description: The small front yard offers the visitor a welcome of wisteria, rhododendron, lilac, and hydrangea blossoms. The back garden is where we like to spend our time. . Since moving here 13 years ago, we have created a peaceful setting of trees and shrubs that fit together. We've added lots of rock paths, shrunk the lawn, enlarged the garden beds, and created a special four-season garden area. See if you can locate the *Enkianthus campanulatus* and the two *Disanthus cercidifolias*. Linger by the unique pond. Seasonally, we also take pleasure in our fresh raspberries, blueberries, black and red currants, lingonberries, espaliered apples, and persimmons.

Directions: Traveling south on 217 from Hwy 26 take the Allen Blvd off ramp (exit 2B).

Turn right onto SW Allen Blvd.
Turn left onto SW Hall Blvd.
Turn right onto SW Hart Rd.
Turn left at SW Sorrento Rd.
Turn right onto SW Barberry Dr.
Turn left at SW 135th Ave.
Turn left at SW Lancewood St.
Turn right onto SW Aralia Pl.

Tim and Ann Lanfri 17955 SW Cooper Mountain Lane, Beaverton, OR

This acre property supports a 75' x 75' year-round vegetable garden.

Description: Raised bed vegetable gardening provides all the produce for a family of 4 throughout the year. In our mild maritime climate, summer plantings produce fresh vegetables from fall through spring without a greenhouse. Vegetables from asparagus to zucchini are grown in 12 raised beds, and berries and fruit are grown in other garden areas. Tim is happy to discuss plant selection and schemes he uses for successful fall and winter gardening. A handout with planting and harvest dates for fall and winter crops will be available.

Directions: From Hwy 217, take the Scholls Ferry Rd. exit (#4B), and travel west on Scholls Ferry approximately 5 miles. Turn right (north) on SW 175th Ave (first right after Roy Rogers Rd); go approximately $\frac{3}{4}$ mile. Turn left on SW Cooper Mountain Ln. Use caution as the turnoff is on a hazardous curve.
